What is Community Power?

New Hampshire cities, towns, and counties can become **default electricity provider** for their residents + businesses and provide related services.



(Customers may switch back to utility default supply or take service from a Competitive Supplier)

Enabling Legislation: RSA 53-E, Relative to Aggregation of Electric Customers by Municipalities & Counties

What is Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire?

- Community-governed power agency operated on a not-for-profit basis (founded Oct. 1, 2021)
- 20 Members, ~119,000 customers, ~960,000 Megawatt-hours per year,
 \$150 million annual revenues
- Revenues controlled by Member cities and towns
- Empowering communities to develop local renewable energy + storage projects and control energy costs
- ✓ Target launch: Spring 2023 for ~12

CPCNH is based on best practices established by these public power agencies



Community Power Roadmap: Three Key Steps



Join the Coalition

Local Governing Body adopts the Coalition's Joint Power Agreement

Appoint primary & alternate representatives to serve on Coalition Board of Directors

Coalition Resources: expert support, explanatory materials & template resolutions

Committee discusses local issues & collects data

Discuss local governance, policies and objectives for the program

Receive aggregate electric load data from the distribution utility

Coalition Resources: governance discussion & data request support

Committee holds Public Hearings & adopts Plan

Committee adopts plan after incorporating public feedback

Governing Body submits the Plan to Legislative Body for adoption

Coalition Resources: educational materials & presentation support

Joint Powers Agreement (JPA)

- **✓** JPA is a contract among municipal and county members establishing the Agency
 - O Financial liabilities & obligations of Agency are "firewalled" from municipal general funds
- ✓ Includes Articles of Agreement and By-Laws (purpose & structure; voting rights; Director & Officer elections; provisions of cost sharing; oversight committees; financial & operational risk management compliance audits; limitations of liability; insurance; etc.)
 - O Up until 21 Members, each Member appoints a Director & Alternate to the Board
 - After 21 Members, a Board of 11-21 will be elected by Member vote at next Annual Meeting (April)
 - O Membership may also hold regular or special meetings throughout the year
 - "One Member One Vote" at all membership meetings (statutory requirement)
- ★ Adopting JPA and joining CPCNH provides access to expertise and resources at no cost
 - No "hard" commitment until Cost Sharing Agreement + Energy Risk Management, Rates & Reserves policies are <u>subsequently</u> approved by governing body (which authorizes CPCNH to procure supply)
- Process: vote of governing body approves the JPA for execution & designates Director & Alternate → and then CPCNH Board votes to approve community as a new Member
